

Overview of the Household Report History and Purpose

- The Household Report has been submitted by grantees since the 1980s.
- The Report allows OCS to report information to Congress about LIHEAP outcomes, as required by the statute.
- Two main types of data need to be reported:
 - Information on households <u>that received</u> LIHEAP assistance
 - Information on households <u>that applied</u> for LIHEAP assistance
- Data are...
 - Published in the annual LIHEAP Report to Congress
 - Published in the <u>LIHEAP Data Warehouse</u>
 - Used to respond to Congressional and White House inquiries

New Updates to the Household Report Changes Last Year for the FY 2020 Report

- Last year, HHS revised the Household Report to include new lines for supplemental funding releases. These changes were made to allow HHS to separately identify the impact of supplemental federal LIHEAP funding.
- For each type of assistance, there were two lines required for reporting:
 - 1. Total Households
 - 2. The subset of households assisted with LIHEAP CARES Act funds

• A third line was reserved for other supplemental funding releases, but not open or editable in FY 2020's report.

New Updates to the Household Report Award of Supplemental ARPA Funds

- In March of 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) (Public Law No: 117-2). Pursuant to SEC. 2911 of H.R. 1319, as part of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Congress appropriated approximately \$4.5 billion in supplemental funds for LIHEAP.
- HHS released the ARPA funds for LIHEAP in May 2021. Any portion of LIHEAP ARPA funds could be obligated in FFY 2021 or later during FFY 2022.
- The Dear Colleague Letter announcing the award of LIHEAP ARPA funds notified grantees that they "must track, account for, and report on" these funds. https://www.acf.hhs.gov/ocs/policy-guidance/liheap-dcl-2021-05-supplemental-funding-release-fy-21

New Updates to the Household Report Award of Supplemental ARPA Funds

- The release of the ARPA funds meant that grantees may have provided assistance to households during FY 2021 with up three different types of federal LIHEAP funds:
 - Regular LIHEAP Funds, including Block Grant funds or Reallotment Funds
 - 2. LIHEAP CARES Act Funds
 - 3. LIHEAP ARPA Funds

New Updates to the Household Report Updates for the FY 2021 Report

- Because the ARPA funds were released during FY 2021, HHS has opened the third line on the report.
- For each type of assistance, there are now three lines required for reporting:
 - 1. Total Households
 - 2. The subset of households assisted with LIHEAP CARES Act funds
 - 3. NEW: The subset of households assisted with LIHEAP ARPA funds

 The reporting of this information assists HHS in identifying and reporting the impacts of supplemental LIHEAP funds on serving eligible households.

New Updates to the Household Report Summary

- There are no changes to the form structure or sections for the FY 2021 Household Report.
- For each type of assistance, grantees still report on total households (first line) and the subset of households that were assisted with CARES Act funds (second line).
- The only change from last year's FY 2020 report is that grantees must now report information on the subset of households that were assisted with LIHEAP ARPA funds during FY 2021 (third line).
- As with last year's report, the report must be submitted via OLDC.

Key Concepts for Reporting



Key Concepts for Reporting Data Needed

Grantees need the following information for each household:

- Types of Assistance Received and Funds Used
 - Regular Assistance Types (heating, cooling)
 - Crisis Assistance Types (winter, summer, year-round, other)
 - Weatherization
 - Nominal Benefits (SNAP)
- Household Poverty Interval
 - Assigned Poverty Interval based on household poverty level
- Vulnerable Member Information
 - Elderly household member (60+ years old)
 - Disabled household member
 - Young children under age six
 - OPTIONAL Young children under age 3
 - OPTIONAL Young children age 3 to 5

Key Concepts for Reporting Assisted and Applicant Households

Assisted Households (Sections I to III and VI to VII)

- Households where a client <u>received LIHEAP assistance</u> using federal LIHEAP funds during the federal fiscal year (October 1 to September 30).
- Report on households, not total persons or the head of household.
- Do not count "approved" households that did <u>not</u> receive assistance.

Applicant Households (Section IV and V)

- Households where a client <u>applied for LIHEAP assistance</u> during the federal fiscal year (October 1 to September 30).
- The definition of "applicant" is not defined by the LIHEAP statute.
 Grantees should report applicant households according to their definitions.

Key Concepts for Reporting Counts of Households, Not Counts of Benefits

- For the Household Report, <u>you are always reporting households, not individual benefits.</u>
- For each line of the report, a household is only counted once in that line.
 - Example: The Johnson household received two year-round crisis benefits (one in the
 winter, one the spring). While they received two benefits, they are one household
 and should be counted once when reporting the count of households that year-round
 crisis assistance.
- Households should be reported for each applicable type of assistance they receive (i.e., reported in each applicable line).
 - Example: The Lee household received one heating benefit and one cooling benefit.
 Report the Lee household under both the applicable "heating assistance" lines and under "cooling assistance" lines.

Key Concepts for Reporting Reporting "Any Type of Assistance" and "Bill Payment Assistance"

- The Household Report requires grantees to report an <u>unduplicated</u> count across different categories of assistance.
- Bill Payment Assistance = Report the count of households that received at least one benefit
 used to pay a share of the household's energy bills and utility deposits. This does not include
 assistance for weatherization or equipment assistance.
- Any Type of Assistance = Report the total count of households that received any LIHEAP
 assistance, including bill payment assistance, weatherization, or equipment assistance.

Example with three households that received assistance:

Household A receives a heating benefit	1	0	0
Household B receives a heating benefit and a cooling benefit	1	1	0
Household C receives weatherization	0	0	1
Any Type of Assistance	3		
Bill Payment Assistance	2		

General Reporting Reminders



Reminder #1: Reporting for Each Type of Assistance

- Report households that received assistance during the Federal Fiscal Year 2021 (October 1, 2020 to September 30, 2021). The includes households served with prior year funds.
- If a grantee indicated that it planned to provide a particular type of assistance in their FY 2021 Model Plan, we would expect to see households reported under that type of assistance in their FY 2021 Household Report.
- In Section II, we would expect grantees to only report households that fall within the gross income thresholds specified in their Model Plans.
 - **REMINDER**: Grantees should assign each household to a poverty interval using the 2020 HHS Poverty Guidelines. They are available here:
 - https://www.acf.hhs.gov/ocs/policy-guidance/liheap-im-2020-01-hhs-poverty-guidelines-optional-use-ffy-2020-and-mandatory

Reminder #2: Collecting and Matching Data from Program Partners

- Some grantees may not directly capture information for Crisis or Weatherization Assistance in their primary LIHEAP data tracking systems.
 - Examples:
 - Your Weatherization Department administers your LIHEAP Weatherization component.
 - A subgrantee administers an emergency equipment program.
- In this situation, Grantees need to obtain household-level data from their subgrantees or program partners who record this information.
- Household-level data is needed to confirm an accurate count of households that received "Any Type of LIHEAP Assistance" by matching households that received Crisis/Weatherization Assistance to households that received other types of LIHEAP assistance.
- Please contact APPRISE if you need assistance with this.

Reminder #3: Reporting "Any Type of Vulnerability"

• In Section III, Column D, "Elderly, Disabled, or Young Child", grantees must report an unduplicated count for each type of assistance with at least one vulnerable member.

- A household with multiple vulnerabilities should only be counted once under each column.
- You should <u>NOT</u> add across the Elderly + Disabled + Young Child columns, because households can have more than one type of vulnerability. This count should be *less than* the sum of elderly, disabled, and young child households in each row/type of assistance.

Reminder #4: Include Notes to Explain Reporting

- The Household Report includes a Notes section.
- If you receive a Warning message in OLDC, you can explain the issue in a note.
- Notes are reviewed and provide useful context. Please do not hesitate to leave notes to explain information that is out of the ordinary or to provide clarification.
- Notes allow for an accurate understanding of the reported data, and OCS uses information from these notes in the Report to Congress.

- **First Line** Submit data on *total households regardless of funding source*. This is consistent with what grantees were required to report in the past.
 - Second Line Submit data on the subset of households that were assisted with LIHEAP CARES Act funding.
 - Third Line Submit data on the subset of households that were assisted with LIHEAP ARPA funding. This is new for FY 2021 reporting.

- The first line under each type of assistance is used to report total households that received that type of assistance from any federal LIHEAP funds.
 - <u>Include</u> all households that received this type of assistance with federal funds. This
 includes households assisted with regular funds, CARES funds, or ARPA funds, or a
 mixture of those funds.
 - Note: The federal funding type used does not matter for this line.
- > Key Point: This is consistent with what grantees were required to report in the past (counting all households assisted with federal LIHEAP funds).

- The second line under each type of assistance is the subset of households that received that assistance from LIHEAP CARES Act funds.
 - <u>Include</u> households who received a benefit for that particular type of assistance that was fully **or** partially funded with LIHEAP CARES Act funds.
 - <u>Exclude</u> households whose benefit for that type of assistance was paid without any LIHEAP CARES Act funds (e.g. only regular LIHEAP funds or LIHEAP ARPA funds were used to provide that assistance to the household).
- Key Point: The same households reported here need to be included in the first line as well. The second line is a subset of households in the first line.

 - **Exclude** households whose benefit was paid without any LIHEAP ARPA funds (e.g. only regular LIHEAP funds or LIHEAP CARES funds were used to provide the assistance to the household).

- The household counts in the first line should be...
 - Greater than or equal to the counts reported in Line 2.
 - Greater than or equal to the counts reported in Line 3.
- If you combined CARES and ARPA funds to provide a type of assistance to households, the household should be reported in all three lines.
- We will review examples later in the presentation.

Reporting Guidance for Each Type of Assistance Grantee Uses of Supplement Funds

- Grantees could have used CARES or ARPA funds during FY 2021 to provide households with assistance in several ways, including:
 - Providing extra supplemental benefits to households who already received benefits for that assistance from regular LIHEAP funds or other supplemental funds (i.e., increasing the benefit level provided to recipient households)
 - 2. Serving more households by providing additional households with an existing type of assistance (i.e., serving more eligible households with a particular type of assistance)
 - 3. Furnishing new assistance that was not previously offered (i.e., creating a new program component)

Reporting Guidance for Each Type of Assistance Identifying LIHEAP ARPA Households

Assisted Households (Applicable to Sections I, II, III, and VI)

- If a grantee <u>expended</u> any LIHEAP ARPA funds to provide households with benefits during FFY 2021 for a type of assistance, the grantee needs to count and report those households.
 - This should <u>include</u> the households that received a benefit that was fully or partially funded with ARP Act funds.
- If a grantee <u>did not</u> expend any of their LIHEAP ARPA funds to provide benefits during FFY 2021 for a type of assistance, the total number reported should be zero.

Reporting Guidance for Each Type of Assistance Identifying LIHEAP ARPA Households

Applicant Households (Applicable to Sections IV and V)

- If a grantee <u>expended</u> any LIHEAP ARPA funds to provide households with benefits during FFY 2021 for a type of assistance, you need to count and report the number of LIHEAP ARPA applicant households.
- o Grantees can use different approaches to report this:
 - If a grantee had a separate application form or process for a household to apply to receive an ARPA-funded benefit, grantees can report the number of households that used that form or process.
 - If a grantee did not have a distinct application form or process to apply to receive an ARPA-funded benefit, the grantee can:
 - Report the total number of households that applied for that type of assistance,
 repeating the information reported for the first line; or
 - Report the number of households that applied for that type of assistance after it began issuing ARPA-funded benefits.

Heating Assistance

- □ Grantee X provided 5,000 households with Heating Assistance using their regular LIHEAP funds.
- When the LIHEAP ARP Act funds were issued, Grantee X decided to use those funds to provide all 5,000 households that got Heating Assistance with a supplemental ARP Act Heating Assistance benefit.
- Grantee X also carried some of their CARES Act LIHEAP allotment over to FY 2021. They decided to use those funds to provide a *second* supplemental payment to the 500 households with highest pre-LIHEAP energy burdens
- Because the supplemental benefits were offered in addition to the regular LIHEAP benefit for each household, the unduplicated count of households receiving heating assistance is 5,000.

Any Type of Assistance

- □ After de-duplicating households that received Heating Assistance, Crisis Assistance, and Weatherization Assistance, Grantee X indicates that 6,000 households received ANY Type of Assistance.
- However, since ARPA and CARES funds were only used to provide supplemental benefits, and were not used for Crisis or Weatherization, we know the counts on Lines 12 and Line 13 should match Line 2 and Line 3 respectively.

Reporting Guidance for Each Type of Assistance Recommendations for IT Staff

- Confirm that you have fields to identify each type of benefit a household received and the type of funds used to provide that benefit.
- Check that your results agree with other information you know about how funds were used during FY 2021.

Example Approach

- Generate the statistics for all households these are the figures for the first line of each assistance type.
- Generate the same statistics for only the subset that received CARES to fill in the second lines (i.e., filter to only those marked as receiving CARES).
- Generate the same statistics for only the subset that received ARPA to fill in the third lines (i.e., filter to only those marked as receiving ARPA).

Report Versions Preliminary and Final Reports

- Preliminary Report due Friday, November 5, 2021
 - This is the report grantees normally submit with their Model Plan.
 - Your preliminary Household Report may contain <u>non-final or estimated data</u>.
- Final Report due Friday, December 31, 2021
 - The final Household Report must contain final data from grantee data tracking systems and program records.
 - Once all data in the Household Report are final, grantees must:
 - Select "no" in response to the question in the Instructions Section: "Do the data below include estimated figures?"
 - Uncheck any "estimated data" checkboxes in Sections I and IV.
 - Grantees may submit revisions to their reports later if corrections are needed.

Data Validations and Checks

Checks in OLDC Prior to Submission

- Validation checks are programmed into OLDC, and a warning or error message will appear if a check fails. Please review these before you submit.
 - Warning Messages indicate data that may be correct but require confirmation and additional explanation in the "Notes" section of the form.
 - <u>Fatal Error Messages</u> indicate inconsistent data that must be corrected before grantees are able to submit their Household Report in OLDC.

Checks After You Submit

- APPRISE checks data following submission in OLDC and will e-mail grantees to alert them to any issues or questions based on their review.
- When your report is confirmed as complete, your liaison will accept it in OLDC.
- If you later identify a correction or change is needed, you will need to submit a revision in OLDC.

Final Reminders Household Report Changes

- There are no changes to the form structure or sections for the FY 2021 Household Report.
- For each type of assistance, grantees still report on total households (first line) and the subset of households that were assisted with CARES Act funds (second line).
- The only change from last year's FY 2020 report is that grantees must now report information on the subset of households that were assisted with LIHEAP ARPA funds during FY 2021 for each type of assistance (third line).
- To complete the final report, grantees need to use their data reporting systems to identify households that received any LIHEAP ARP Act funds.
- Grantees facing challenges with understanding the reporting requirements should contact APPRISE.

Final Reminders Due Dates, Submission, Validation

- The preliminary report with estimated data is due Friday, November 5, 2021.
- The final Household Report is due in OLDC on Friday, December 31, 2021.
- Remember that the Household Report must be:
 - Entered in OLDC


